

Kenneth Pomeranz is Distinguished Professor of History at the University of California, Irvine, and President-Elect of the American Historical Association. His publications include *The Great Divergence: China, Europe, and the Making of the Modern World Economy* (which won the John K. Fairbank Prize from the AHA, and shared the World History Association book prize) *The Making of a Hinterland: State, Society and Economy in Inland North China, 1853-1937* (which also won the Fairbank Prize), *The World that Trade Created* (with Steven Topik), and a collection of his essays. He has also edited or co-edited 5 books, and published many articles in both scholarly and popular venues. He is a Fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, and has received fellowships from the Guggenheim Foundation, the American Philosophical Society, American Council of Learned Societies, The Institute for Advanced Studies, and other sources; he has given over 200 invited academic lectures in 17 countries.. He is co-editor of the *Journal of Global History* and of a book series at UC Press, and was the founding director of the UC Multi-Campus Research Group in World History.. Trained as a historian of late imperial and 20th century China, his research interests include comparative economic development, state formation and empire, environmental history, peasant movements, and the history of popular religion.
